In view of the tragically short time remaining before the execution date on June 18, the Melbourne Sare the Rosenbergs' Committee has appealed to all lo-ers of justlee not only to make a great protest in the Assembly Hall next Monday night, but to lose no time in sending mass and individual protests to President Eisenhower, or US representatives in Canberra and Melbourne.

"Every democrat has a duty to prevent an awful injustice being committed and to secure a new trial," declared a spokesman of the Save the Rosenbergs Committee yesterday.

Many leading personalities, both in America and other countries, have challenged the justice of the Rosenbergy trial on a charge of "conspiracy to commit espionage." Among these are Prof. Albert Einstein, leading American atomic scientist, Prof. Harold Urey and world famous British scientist, Prof. J. D. Ber. 102.

Baviol Urey and worse tamous British scientist, Prof. J. D. Bernal has declared that the information which the Rosenbergs are alleged to have "conspired" to pass on was not only not "secret" but has been published in scientific journals from 1838 on.

Among other glaring injustices, both in the death sentence and conviction, which have been pointed out by leading world legal authorities, including Mr. D. N. Pritt, QC, are these:—

• The Rosenbergs were convicted on the evidence of a self-confessed spy, Greenglass, who, himself, has been sentenced to only 15 years, while the Rosenbergs who are supposed to have "conspired" to get information from him are sentenced to death.

• No American has ever been executed for espionage in peace-time and the Resembergs were only charged with "conspiracy to commit espionage."

• The maximum sentence for convolution on this charge is 20 journ—lence the death sentence theory is a violation of the law.

The year in which the Rosenbergs are alleged to have committed this "conspiracy" was 1944, when the Soviet Union was an ally of the USA. In view of these and other grave anomalies and doubts about the conviction and death sentence, millions throughout the world have asked for a retrial and for the setting aside of the death sentence.

The Pope has twice asked for clemency on the grounds of Christian mercy and humanity to the parents of two young children. Leaders of many other denominations have also asked for clemency.

The refusal of the American.

The refusal of the American Government to heed these world-wide pleas shows that it is not concerned, either with justice or humanity, but only with a desperate attempt to vindicate its anti-Soviet war policy.

If the Rosenbergs' case were quashed, all the lurid stories of Soviet atom spiles in the USA would collepse.

Their execution would provide a precedent paving the way to the death sentence in America for every opponent of aggressive American war policy.

The winning of justice for the Rosenbergs is therefore a vital part of the battle for peace. A great democratic battle in America, backed by world-wide protests, had saved the Rosenbergs for two years since their sentence. At this moment, when the forces of world peace have reached a decisive stage of struggle with the American warmongers, justice for the Rosenbergs can well be a powerful blow tipping the balance in favor of the forces of world peace.

Menzies' 'health' cuts living standards

THE Menzies Government's so-called Hospital and Medical Benefit schemes which are to come fully into operation on July 1 represent one of the biggest frauds yet perpetrated on the Australian people and strike directly at the Australian standards of living.

Briefly the aim of the Menzies Medical Benefits' schemes are only Government is to place all social the first steps on the road to full sorvices on a compulsory contributory insurance basis.

A contributory old age pensions scheme is at present being planned to follow the hospital and medical schemes, and to replace the present non-contributory old age pensions.

tory old age pensions.

The compulsory contributions to insurance or benefit societies will not reduce taxation. The social service tax originally levied to meet expanded social services is still being collected but has been diverted into consolidated revenue. This enables this money to go to war preparations and profitable contracts to hig business.

The government at present still makes some contribution towards "benefits" for insured persons but the way is open for the government to reduce or withdraw altogether its contribution at any stage, or to water it down by inflation.

The purpose of the government's contribution at the pre-sent stage is to force the people into the insurance of benefit societies. Once this purpose has been achieved the government can start wriggling out of its present limited payment,
